- The Stanford Prison Experiment (2015) this is based on research by Professor Philip Zimbardo in 1971, a study we learn within Social Influence
- Experimenter (2015) based on research by Stanley Milgram in 1961, another study that you need to learn
- Room (2015) this links to Developmental Psychology and cases of recovery from adverse experience
- Rainman (1988) based on the life of Kim Peek, a case of savant syndrome (Autism alongside other areas of exceptional ability)
